

IMMIGRANTS ARE A VITAL PART OF AMERICA'S FUTURE

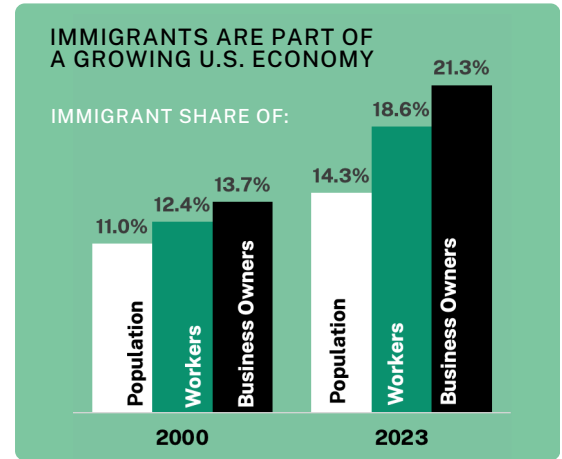
Just as we came together from different places and races to build the United States in past decades, a strong future for our country includes immigrants

Immigrant workers and business owners grow America's economy

48 million immigrants reside in the United States. Immigrants work in low-wage, middle-wage, and higher-wage jobs in sectors across our country's economy. Together, immigrant workers and business owners generated \$4.6 trillion of economic output in the United States in 2022. The contribution of immigrants to GDP is about the same as the immigrant share of the population.

Immigrants work in jobs that span the economic spectrum, including:

- 27% of janitors
- 37% of construction laborers
- 47% of maids
- 18% of truck drivers
- 16% of registered nurses
- 14% of retail supervisors
- 46% of software developers
- 28% of physicians
- 15% of chief executives



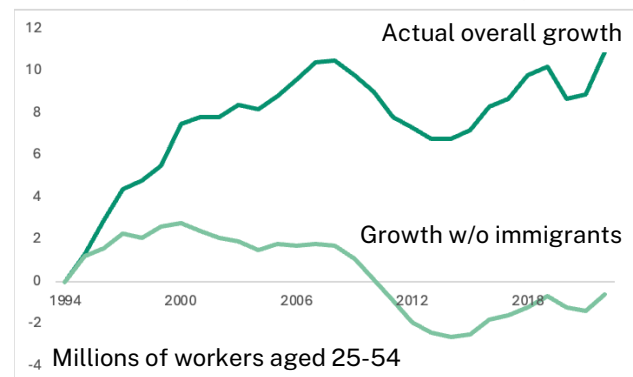
Immigration increases economic growth and job opportunities
