Restaurants

Domestic Care Economy

35% of all homehealth aides are immigrants.



Healthcare

11% of all registered nurses are immigrants.

Immigrants are an essential part of the Mohawk Valley's workforce. In restaurants immigrants are cooks, dishwashers and small business owners. In the healthcare economy immigrants provide essential care in communities as registered nurses. And in the domestic care economy immigrants are often the ones who make it possible for parents to go to work knowing their kids and elders in need of help are in good hands.

- ↑ Higher prices for goods & services as the labor force shrinks
- ↑ Increased cost of living
